AccuQuilt has already featured QOVF on their March 29 livestream event and plans to discuss their Block Drive more on May 24, the end of July, and on November 8.

FRENCH LEGION HONOREE RECEIVES QUILT OF VALOR

Retired Corporal Edward M. of the U.S. Army was thanked and honored for his service to the United States with a Quilt of Valor during an award ceremony at Trinity Village in Papillion, NE. Edward enlisted in the Army at the age of seventeen in January 1941. After basic training, he was assigned to the First Infantry Division, "The Big Red One." He spent 3 years, 1 month and 11 days in foreign service. As a member of the First Infantry, he was one of 34,000 Allied Forces that landed on Omaha Beach in Normandy on D-Day. He was also at the Battle of the Bulge, in Poland, and several places in Africa and Italy.

Edward was awarded a U.S. Bronze Star for shooting a German dive bomber with a heavy machine gun. He also

received a French Legion of Honor medal, which is the highest French decoration and one of the most famous in the world. For two centuries, this medal has been presented on behalf of the French Head of State to reward those most deserving. He was honorably discharged on 20th of September, 1945 at the rank of Corporal Tec-5.

Saluting Edward and thanking him for his service was Terry J., lifetime

member of the American Legion Post #32 in South Omaha. Others attending the award ceremony were Edward's son, Jeff, and grandson, Eddie of Omaha.

The QOV was made by Jackie M. of Papillion, quilted by Kathy H., and bound by 100-year-old Ruby H., who is also a resident of Trinity Village. Trinity resident Nona M. and Piecemakers' QOV Group volunteer Jackie M. planned and facilitated the ceremony.

FAMILY OF PATRIOTS

In February 2018, our group awarded a Quilt of Valor to John T., the father of Jo Ann, one of our QOV members. John T. served in the Army Air Corp during WWII as a B24 mechanic and flight engineer in Italy. John has since passed away, but we remember him as always patriotic. He enjoyed sharing his stories of being in the military, let us store our group's longarm machine in his home, and accompanied us to other QOV presentations.

Several years later, in 2021, we were honored to award QOVs to second and third generations of this family that Jo Ann made especially for these family members. Her brother, John C.T., was an Army paratrooper and parachute rigger during Vietnam. John's brother-in-law, John D., served in the Marine Corps and was also in Vietnam. John's son-in-law, R.H. (Tripp), still on active duty in the Army, has served in numerous conflicts and was wounded during the Black Hawk Down mission. Tripp himself comes from a long line of Army veterans, with his father and both grandfathers attending West Point.

The most touching letter we have ever received came from John D. He wrote to Jo Ann to thank her for his QOV and we want to share that letter with other QOV members. It is families like this who help keep us free and we are grateful for their service and sacrifice.

Dear JoAnn

Thank you, again, for the beautiful Quilt. It is highly treasured and admired. To All those who participate in this endeavor a well done and thanks.

The form you ask me to fill out is enclosed. The question as to how I was touched by the War, while not difficult, needs explaining. As you know, I was raised in a home with honesty, and a positive value system. At the time, I'm not sure I fully understood how important these things were, but I learned and began to appreciate them when in Vietnam.

Combat has been characterized as hours of sheer boredom, interspersed with moments of sheer terror. This is, to some degree, very true. Fear comes in many forms. Knowing you are going to a target that has heavy ground fire is frightening. Knowing you are taking off in the middle of the night in heavy rain and fog is the same. However, the most scared I ever was, occurred when my flight leader, Major Miles Mixson, and I were scrambled off the "hot pad" to provide close air support for a trapped Marine Recon Team. It was almost dark when we flew into stormy weather. As we descended into the target area, the Marine Air Controller gave us our target brief. The weather was 2500 feet overcast, in moderately hilly country. The Marine Recon Team was surrounded by the enemy, who were within 30 meters of the Marine position. We were told to expect heavy small arms fire, and to turn off our running lights. The team had wounded, and was awaiting rescue by several Marine helicopters. I can tell you without reservation I have never been so scared. The thought of dropping napalm that close to friendlies was terrifying. The leader dropped first, and as I rolled in, the controller asked me to drop my napalm slightly closer but a little short. God was with me that night for I dropped exactly where it was needed. The recon team was subsequently extracted, and we completed our bombing of the target. We returned to Chu Lai and an uneventful night.

So, how does all this impact me in my life? I am now more aware that we are not alone in this world. Seldom do we do anything that doesn't involve directly, or indirectly, someone else. In combat you fight for the guy next to you, or, in this case, the guys on the ground who need you. You take care of your buddies, no matter what. I am, now, deeply aware that my actions and words impact others, and learned that I am responsible for my actions. While more outgoing and friendly, I am less tolerant of those who are self-serving and selfish or those who do not share a positive value system.

Jo, please share this with others. Again, Thank You and all those who share our love of this Country.

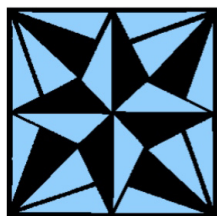

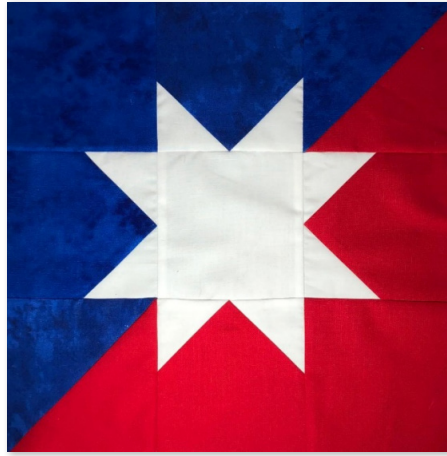
